Why Academic Advising?

"Academic Advising is the only structured activity on the campus in which all students have the opportunity for one-to-one interaction with a concerned representative of the institution" (Habley, 1994).

Student Retention


CAS's new advising model

- 28 mentor advisors chosen from across all academic divisions
- Faculty choose to participate in FY Advising
- In the CAS, academic advisors are faculty members. Faculty teach the courses and design the curricula, so who better to guide students in course selection and curriculum navigation?

Results of change

- Before new model, student satisfaction with advising hovered around 70%
- First year of new model, student satisfaction with advising rose to 92%
- This year student satisfaction with advising rose slightly more than 95%

Schaufeld Scholars

- There are 21 Schaufeld scholars selected through interviews with 37 applicants.
- The scholars represent 14 majors from across the College of Arts and Sciences.
- These upper-level students serve as peer academic mentors for first year students and assist with the transition to their academic life here at Lehigh.

Schaufeld Scholars

- Scholars were available to assist faculty advisors during Orientation, helped students with drop/add, and as one advisor noted, the scholars helped the first-year students "maintain a sense of perspective."
- Scholars have been assigned a cohort of firstyear students and check in with these students throughout the semester.

5 x 10 programs:

- "What I Wish I Knew my First Year": 163 students attended
- "Pins, Alt-Pins, and Portals":

150 attended



First-Generation Students

- We began working with a group of students who are interested in creating a better climate at Lehigh for first-generation college students. Discussions with this group about the unique needs of first-generations students led us to help with the following programs:
- Collaborations with the Financial Aid office to offer workshops on filling out the FAFSA forms.
- Assistance with forming a student club on campus for firstgeneration students (FIRST)
- Assistance with implementing a text book lending library
- Support and guidance for attending the national first-gen conference
