Operation Graduation Getting to 90% (or better)

Challenges

- Increasing graduation rates is a long-term effort
- Easy to identify *generally* why students leave; much harder to identify *specific* factors to change
- Improving retention and persistence is a diffuse process that involves coordination across many campus units
- Building a "critical mass" of students of color is a medium-term effort
- Difficult to discern, in advance, what retention efforts and programming will be most cost-effective
- Cultural change creating a more welcoming and inclusive environment is a difficult and long-term effort
- Some initiatives are expensive

Operation Graduation Getting to 90% (or better)

Some recent initiatives:

- Setting a goal! Part of the Path to Prominence
- LUSSI (for incoming freshmen)
- Late financial aid to returning students
- Half-semester, 2 credit course to maintain full-time status (and financial aid) for students dropping courses
- CAS academic advising office (opened Fall 2015)
- Two-semester version of MATH 21 for engineering students (began fall 2015)
- FIRST Student Organization
- First Generation Initiative
- Data Analytics Project (Fall 2016)
