Learning Styles

Understanding your dominant learning style and using study strategies that complement your style will help you to study more effectively and efficiently!

Visual Learners...

- Learn best by seeing and reading
- Enjoy visual stimulation, color, vivid imagery
- Relate most effectively to written information, notes, maps, diagrams and pictures

Learning Strategies

- Sit in the front of the class where you can see your professor's facial expressions and body language
- Use color or symbols to highlight important points in text or notes
- Study the illustrations, graphs, diagrams, etc. in your books
- Illustrate your ideas by drawing maps, diagrams, graphs, tables
- Make mental pictures; visualize concepts
- When memorizing material, write it over & over

Auditory Learners...

- Learn best by listening
- Prefer directions given orally
- Relate most effectively to the spoken word

Learning Strategies

- Think aloud and talk to yourself
- Participate in class discussions and debates; make speeches and presentations
- Read text out loud—especially when proofreading or when tired
- Create jingles and use mnemonics to aid in memorization
- Use a tape recorder—tape yourself reading your notes and play it back
- Discuss ideas /course concepts with a friend or small group
- Work in a study group
- Recite information over and over to better memorize material
- Sit where you are sure to hear the professor!

Kinesthetic/Tactile Learners...

- Learn best through moving and doing
- Learn best through a hands-on method
- Enjoy tasks that involve manipulating materials and objects

Learning Strategies

- Sit near the door or someplace else where they can easily get up and move around
- Vary your activities and take frequent study breaks
- Make studying more physical stand, chew gum, pace while memorizing, read while on a stepper, squeeze a tennis ball, etc.
- Use a hands on approach computing, making models, pointing to or underlining text, writing on white board, etc.
- Use flash cards or make lists for each term or each step in a process review cards and process lists regularly
