
#### End of the Year Survey Insights

### "Collaborative Connections"

believed their community showed generosity\*, offering to others without expectation of return, compared to 48% of Trembley & Brodhead

Sayre Park residents also identified connectedness\* within their community in higher percentages than Taylor, Trembley or Brodhead

Conduct trends continue decreasing dramatically in number of alcohol & drug incidents trends also decrease in residents documented



Approximately 17% of the Sayre Park residents completed the end of the year survey questions. 14 Students were identified by Heather to interview, and all 14 participated in an interview.

## "Creative Curiosity"

When asked about being exposed to new intellectual ideas and exposing others to new intellectual ideas...



Of Sayre residents agreed or strongly agreed that their exposure was based on residing in their residential community. compared to 36% of Trembley & Brodhead

This is a 23% increase in perceived exposure than reported by Sayre residents in '13-'14

"I was talking to Braydon about my career options and life and he offered me an internship at his company. Having someone who is wise, not from an academic setting is important. He brings a new perspective."

### "Inclusive Leadership"

Of Sayre residents believe that living with a faculty member has some to a significant impact on their ...

"The interactions with the kids remind me of how fragile the process of growing up is and makes me reflect on how I grew up compared to them. It is important to know someone's social context from how they grew up."

Quotes inside colored boxes were taken directly from individual student interviews with Sayre Park residents

- Discussed the feeling of home that resonates in the community because **100%** → of the family presence
- **79%**  $\rightarrow$  Talked about the benefit of having accessible mature adult role models
- Alluded to demonstrating respectful behaviors as second nature for the **64%** → community
- 50%  $\rightarrow$  Referred to the children as an impetus and sustained reason for conscious mature decision making

A lot of time with professors you don't want to waste their time so you have an agenda and the conversations are a lot more focused. With Heather, I came back from pacing break early and was able to have a conversation with her about life in general. She is a role model based on her life outside of, as well as in academics."

"Maybe it is the kids. They see me as a role model and I am very aware of that. I don't want them to see my bad habit [chewing tobacco] and think it's cool. I'm a part of their growing up right now. It really changes how I see myself as a role model and how I want them to see me."

A subset of 4 questions in the survey examined the role modeling attitudes and behaviors of Sayre Park residents with the Johnson children

Believed their actions, words, and social decisions were consciously impacted by the presence of the children

The perception of the residents is that the presence of a live in faculty member has a greater impact on their personal viewpoints and ability to think critically about those than the residential community has by itself.
