





Research Opportunities at Lehigh University through the Perspective of a Current Student's Experiences

Hello incoming students, and congratulations on being here today at Lehigh University! You should be so proud of yourself and your accomplishments! We know we are proud of you for being here.

This part of the Orientation Times will tell you more about the opportunities that you have at Lehigh University to get involved. As you get to know campus and start meeting people around you, you might notice how involved everyone is and how many opportunities you can be a part of. Isn't that so amazing? I know I was excited to get involved!

As a Returning Orientation Leader and a current junior, I have been involved with two research opportunities on campus. Your research experience can start as early as your first year and as late as your last semester at Lehigh. Try not to stress about it, and just be open to opportunities that might arise. Many people on campus get involved through the college they are in, through work study, or through

relationships built with faculty.

There are many opportunities like one of the Fellowships or the Mountaintop Summer Experience, both sponsored by Lehigh University. On the other hand, you can get involved through finding a research lab that a professor is involved with and get credits for helping. You can also join a lab where a professor is assisted, and the school pays you through a work study award. These opportunities can all be explored through the Office of the Vice Provost for Research, or through expressed interest in a certain subject area with a specific faculty member.

Personally, my experience with faculty and anyone that I have reached out to at Lehigh University has been smooth, and everyone has been easy to communicate with. The faculty here can always tell if you are genuinely interested, and this is why we are known for giving so many undergraduates a chance to be part of research! As a political science and psychology double major with a minor in marketing,

I have had an opportunity to take an array of classes and back up my knowledge with skills built in labs by helping professors and communicating with them as soon as I express an interest in the subject they research. All the professors and their research opportunities can be found on the website of the major and/or college that you are associated with or interested in.

These research opportunities give you a chance to work closely with faculty while getting paid or receiving credits, as well as building a strong foundation to work as you are showing that your grades and knowledge are proven in a skill. This is also a great way to decide if research or the specific field you chose is something that you want to pursue in the future. This provides a great opportunity to show skills in a minor or a couple of classes that you might take that are backed up by real-life experience.

Beyond Borders: The Journey to Explore Abroad

Throughout my life, I have always wanted to travel the world. Going to all seven continents has been at the top of my bucket list. I am fascinated by places that are unfamiliar, and cultures that are different from my own. That being said, traveling around the world is not always easy. Concerns regarding funding, planning, and safety stand in the way of going abroad for many – including myself. Sorting out the logistics of leaving the United States is challenging. However, when you go abroad through Lehigh, none of this is a concern. The school has a plethora of amazing programs aimed at allowing all students to explore the world with little to no worry

I feel incredibly lucky to be participating in one of these programs. This summer, I am going to Bududa, Uganda on a faculty-led trip through the Iacocca International Internship. The Iacocca International Internship is a fantastic program that sends Lehigh students to over 50 locations to intern or complete research with global host organizations. It is designed to aid Lehigh students in career readiness and intercultural competency. Iacocca is nearly fully funded - with a goal of targeting those who have limited or no abroad experience. Additionally, it is organized in a manner that prepares and guides students before, during, and after they go on their trip. With an emphasis on open communication and collaboration between the Iacocca International Internship Program staff, Iacocca interns, faculty trip leaders, and host organizations, the opportunity sets all up for success.

As of right now, about a month out from my trip, I feel nothing but excitement. For seven weeks, I will be working with an organization called the

Pathways Development Initiative (PDI). The PDI is dedicated to improving the sustainable livelihoods of families in the Bududa district through education, community outreach, and extracurricular programs. During my time in Uganda, myself and a cohort of thirteen other students will be interning in a school, hospital, research center, and sports center in order to empower families and individuals involved with the PDI. I feel very honored to be aiding such an inspiring organization.

When people ask me what I am looking forward to the most, I do not know what to say! I am anxious to meet new people; get to know the other Lehigh students on the trip; learn about Ugandan



traditions; live abroad; try a new cuisine; learn a bit of a different language; have a unique work experience; and see sites that I have never seen before. I will be staying in a homestead with the rest of the Lehigh students, as well as our faculty leader Dean Austin of the College of Arts and Sciences. The gracious family that started the PDI, the Zaale's are providing us all with rooms, food, and company. They are all wonderful people who will be mentoring us through our stay. During work breaks, we will also be going on neat excursions. About half way through the trip,

we will head to Murchison Falls where we will see a rhino sanctuary, go on an African safari, and hike through mountainous Africa. Later into the trip, we will travel to the Sipi Heritage Lounge where we will stay in huts that overlook beautiful waterfalls. It will truly be a once in a lifetime experience that I would never have had if not for the Iacocca International Internship Program.

I do not want Uganda to be my last trip during my time at Lehigh. In the future, I plan on applying for even more abroad programs! I will definitely drop into the Office of International Affairs to get mentorship on my next trips. My sophomore year summer, I intend to apply to Granada, Spain for a Spanish language credit-bearing trip, and in my junior year, I want to spend a semester overseas in an undetermined place. I want to take advantage of the opportunities to go abroad at the school while I can! It is such a relief to know that if I want to go abroad during the school year, my financial aid package will go with me, and if I go abroad during a break, I will be able to apply for grants to cover the costs. I know that once I graduate, finding time to take big trips will be a little more difficult.

If I were to give any advice to incoming students, it would be to apply for everything! Any club, organization, sports team, abroad programs, or opportunity that you are interested in is worth trying out for! I was told several times that first-year students do not get chosen for experiences like the Iacocca internship. If I had trusted this statement and not applied, I would not be awaiting an African adventure!


All-You-Care-to-Eat is available for breakfast, lunch, dinner and brunch at our student restaraunts: Rathbone and Brodhead. One meal swipe allows for an all-you-care-to-eat dining experience, with the option to dine in or take a meal to go through our eco-container program.

DINING DOLLARS

This declining balance account can be used exclusively at all Lehigh University Dining locations. Dining Dollars are non refundable, nontransferable, and will carry over from Fall semester to Spring semester only. Students can add additional funds to their Dining Dollars account at any time through the online student housing and dining portal.

MEAL CREDITS

When you purchase a meal plan, you have the added benefit of meal credits that you can use at our retail locations and food trucks across campus. A Meal Credit is a cash value applied to your food purchases at retail locations on campus for those times when you don't eat at Rathbone or Brodhead. This increases the flexibility of your meal plan. In exchange for a regular meal swipe, you receive a credit toward the total cost of your retail purchase. The balance of your purchase can be paid with Dining Dollars, GoldPLUS or Debit/Credit.







Student Senate (which is essentially Lehigh's student government), is an organization that focuses on empowering the community to build a better Lehigh. It is great for students who are interested in government and politics, or individuals who are simply looking to enact positive change at Lehigh. As someone who was involved in student council in high school and majoring in Political Science, I've found that Senate strongly reflects my passions and future goals. Additionally, each Senator serves on one of eight committees. These committees include: Allocations (reviews budget requests to help fund clubs and organizations), Bethlehem Outreach (works to strengthen the relationship between Lehigh and the Bethlehem community), Club Affairs (aids in approving the

official recognition of clubs), Diversity & Inclusion (plans initiatives to foster a more diverse, inclusive and equitable community at Lehigh), Facilities & Services (communicates student feedback to help improve the Lehigh experience), Health Safety & Wellness (encourages a strong balance of wellness and health to promote the safety of all students), Student Outreach (plans campus-wide events and works to receive feedback from students on campus issues), and Public Relations (communicates Senate initiatives to the community). Committees are a great way to get closer with a small cohort of individuals, as well as expand your knowledge on issues or initiatives you may be unfamiliar with.

Strategic Adaptability recognizes that we are all navigating in constantly changing environments. We want you to build skills in problem-solving, flexibility, and decision-making by learning from failures and taking risks.

These five foundations are embedded into Lehigh programming and opportunities across campus.

With these tools in mind, what will your Lehigh journey look like? It's a rhetorical question, really, because no matter how much you plan, your four years here are guaranteed to have ups and downs. You may have an idea of where you are headed; maybe you'll follow that path, or maybe new opportunities will show you unexpected and exciting new turns. 





Entrepreneurship: Transform Ideas into Impact

Hi first-year students! I am incredibly excited that you have selected Lehigh to spend your next four years in developing your path to success! I remember exactly what it was like being in your shoes as a Lehigh student for the first time. Being in your first-year is all about finding your footing by discovering resources and programs at Lehigh that will help you to reach your goals. College is an excellent opportunity to try things that you may have never thought to try before. While you are figuring out what you want your Lehigh experience to look like, consider taking advantage of a few entrepreneurship programs available to you. It is perfectly okay to not know what entrepreneurship means or if you are unsure about becoming an entrepreneur! Any student in any major can be involved in entrepreneurship-related opportunities at Lehigh.

Entrepreneurship finds its home at Lehigh through the Baker Institute for Entrepreneurship, right on campus inside Whitaker Lab. The Baker Institute hosts several programs, which range from building the foundation of entrepreneurship all the way to supporting the development of studentcreated projects. The first of these programs is the Hatchery, a six-week summer program where students solve real-world problems through developing their own projects. The Baker Institute also hosts the EUREKA! Venture Program, which supports student venture ideas through every stage of developing new products, from first idea to official launch. In addition, EUREKA! Pitch Nights are hosted every month to give students a platform to present their ideas in front of expert reviewers and compete for funding.

I was lucky enough to take part in Baker Institute's Lehigh Silicon Valley program. This is a type of "domestic study-abroad" experience in which I, along with a select group of students, learned about all stages of entrepreneurship and traveled to San Francisco during the winter break. We were taught how to think like an entrepreneur through interactive

sessions with Lehigh alumni, founders, and CEOs. During the program, we were able to tour a variety of startups, private equity firms, and corporate offices in the Bay area. Being a member of the Lehigh Silicon Valley 2024 cohort has been one of the highlights of my Lehigh experience. LehighSiliconValley opened my eyes to what entrepreneurship entails through the perspective of not just startup companies, but large corporations as well. My presentation skills

improved significantly from proposing solutions in front of business leaders in live cases. In addition, I created life-changing connections with other peers, Lehigh alumni, founders, and executives exclusively through this program.

Baker Institute offers a wide range of entrepreneurship resources, creativity experiences, and innovation tailored to Lehigh students. Another program that students find beneficial is Lehigh@ Nasdaq. This education-industry provides students with hands-on learning opportunities to work with startups through internships. The Startup Academy program takes place over 10 weeks in the summer in San Francisco, where students intern full-time for early-to-mid stage startups. In addition, a fun fact about Startup Academy is that at the conclusion of the students' internships, they are featured on a digital billboard of the Nasdaq Tower in Times Square to show off their accomplishments!

One of the best pieces of advice I have ever received was to try things that catch my eye, even if it was something I have no experience in. Many students at Lehigh, including myself, would agree that taking advantage of entrepreneurship opportunities has changed their perspective on the world around them for the better. As you embark on your academic journey at Lehigh, I encourage you to take some of these programs into consideration and try it out for yourself! I wish you all the best, at Lehigh and beyond!
